Autism spectrum disorders (ASDs) are complex, lifelong developmental disabilities characterised by marked difficulties in social interaction and communication. Every individual on the autistic spectrum has problems to some degree with social skills,

empathy, communication, and the ability to be flexible.

A Success Story is a simple method that may be used to improve a child's understanding of social situations in a non-threatening and reassuring manner and help him/her make a more effective response.
